Maryland Medical Assistance Program – Dental Coverage For Adults Legislation moves forward after approval in House and Senate committees



In Annapolis, legislation to expand dental coverage to all adults in Maryland Medicaid is moving forward and has passed the crossover phase in both chambers of the Maryland General Assembly!

The hard work of members, partners, and stakeholders through a multi-year campaign to expand access to oral health care for all low income Maryland adults has resulted in a growing recognition of the significance of oral health to overall health by Maryland legislators. These efforts aided the passage of legislation that gradually integrate dental care into health care delivery systems across Maryland. And now, during the 2022 session of the Maryland General Assembly, state legislators are taking monumental steps to

further invest in the overall health and well-being of Maryland's vulnerable adult population by establishing adult dental coverage as part of Maryland Medicaid.


As we all know, and Maryland legislators recognize, the need for adult dental coverage in Medicaid is great. Although dental professionals statewide strive to help at-need patients through programs that offer low-cost care, or through non-profits that offer free services, it is not enough. The struggle to obtain needed dental care puts many of our most vulnerable citizens at risk, often resulting in oral health issues that make it difficult to manage dental pain, control a chronic disease, obtain employment, or even eat, speak, or socialize.

With just a few weeks remaining in the 2022 legislative session, members, partners, and stakeholders are strongly encouraged to continue to communicate with their legislators, thanking them for their important support of adult dental coverage in Maryland Medicaid and for taking a critical step forward in dismantling health disparities experienced by many low income Maryland adults and change the lives of hundreds of thousands of Maryland residents for the better.

National Health Leaders Call for Action on Oral Health Inequities Understanding of the intersection of oral, overall, and mental health needed

In a recently published perspective article in the New England Journal of Medicine, NIDCR Director Dr. Rena D'Souza, Science Advisor to the President and former NIH Director Dr. Francis S. Collins, and US Surgeon General Dr. Vivek H. Murthy highlight that addressing oral health disparities will require significant changes. Drawing on findings and recommendations from Oral Health in America: Advances and Challenges, the article's authors advocate for actions to make oral health care accessible and affordable for all Americans that includes understanding the intersection of oral health with overall and mental health.

In the article, national health leaders note that equalizing oral health and access to care will require research and policy initiatives that make oral health care more affordable, accessible, and responsive to communities. These initiatives would need to include integrating oral, medical, and behavioral health care into traditional and non-traditional health care settings, such as schools and community health centers. In addition,



communities need to be included in the planning, design, and execution of these oral health care systems.

Harnessing policy changes and fully integrating oral health with a greater emphasis on prevention can effectively address inequities and improve the overall health of individuals, families, and communities.

Oral Health Care and Primary Health Care: Stronger Together in Recognizing and Managing Diabetes

A new research report from the American Dental Education Association

Evidence continues to grow on the strong link between oral health and overall health. Also known as the oral-systemic link, the connection between oral health and systemic health has called attention to the role of oral disease in contributing to poor overall health. According to an increasing number of studies, oral health diseases—particularly periodontitis—are associated with a variety of serious, systemic diseases. The most prominent among these is diabetes, one of the leading causes of death in the United States.

In 2020, the Maryland Department of Health issued its first ever Diabetes Action Plan, which includes intervention strategies for health care providers, stakeholders and individuals to help reduce the burden of diabetes in Maryland. Issued as a roadmap to preventing and managing diabetes, the plan includes a chapter dedicated to oral health, specifically citing periodontal disease as the most common dental disease affecting those living with diabetes. Periodontal disease has been reported to complicate the management of diabetes and metabolic control, while diabetes in turn is an established risk factor for periodontal disease. A coordinated approach to the management of both diabetes and periodontitis is critical to achieve optimal health in patients with these diseases.

The need for organized management of systemic and oral diseases has helped give rise to the integration of oral health care and primary health care. The recognition that the burden of chronic diseases can be lessened by a movement toward whole body health has helped advance efforts s to integrate oral and general health care. Taking this into account, oral and primary health care are developing means of collaboration—such as providing mutually supportive tools that support the integration of care. The 2022 American Diabetes Association's Standards of Care guidelines currently reinforce the need to screen for diabetes in the dental setting.

This research report discusses the importance of dental education in preparing future oral health care providers with the training necessary to recognize the oral-systemic link, and thus to contribute to the integrated care needs of all patients.

ADA Urges HRSA to Prioritize Workforce, Oral Health Disparities Encourages installation a Chief Dental Officer to oversee efforts

The American Dental Association is asking the Health Resources and Services Administration to prioritize several issues, including addressing dental workforce shortages and oral health disparities.

In a Feb. 15 letter to Carole Johnson, the new HRSA administrator, the ADA President Cesar R. Sabates, D.D.S. alongside the ADA Executive Director Raymond A. Cohlmia, D.D.S., welcomed the opportunity for the Association to work with HRSA on the following issues:

- Addressing dental workforce shortages through Title VII oral health training grants.
- Expanding efforts to increase the dental workforce in underserved communities through the Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education program.
- Continuing to fund the National Health Service Corps Scholarship Program, including the National Students Service Loan Repayment Program.
- Expediting Provider Relief Fund reconsideration applications.
- Improving public and medical provider education about oral health to meet the HHS Healthy People target for utilization of the oral health care system.
- Addressing oral health disparities to achieve optimal oral health for all people.
- Continuing to prioritize integration of oral health and primary care practice.
- Reforming health professional shortage area scoring.
- Addressing parity between dental case management and medical case management.
- Training Medicaid auditors to ensure that dental program integrity is fair and efficient without jeopardizing access to care.
- Ensuring loan repayment equity for early career-dentists in federally qualified health centers with added clarity on eligible health professional shortage area scores.
- Giving loan repayment to dentists collaborating with addiction specialists.
- Supporting medical-dental collaboration projects.
- Promoting the value of community water fluoridation.
- Addressing maternal and child dental needs such as sealants and access to care for pregnant women.

The Community Health Worker (CHW) Certification Training Program Over 1000 CHWs Have Been Certified in Maryland!

MDAC has long recognized the critical role that CHWs play in helping individuals navigate pathways to good health. They work with individuals in their homes to improve health behaviors, address social determinants of health, and facilitate access to needed services. They also conduct workshops to help individuals manage chronic diseases and participate in outreach events to educate the public on the benefits of good health behaviors. CHWs provide a critical link to better health, working in health departments, clinics, senior centers, hospitals, area health education centers, and community organizations. The job of a community health worker requires core competencies including cultural humility; strong communication, interpersonal, observational, and organizational skills, and a solid foundation in care coordination, health education, outreach, and capacity building.

The Maryland Department of Health (MDH) is accepting accreditation applications from Community Health Worker (CHW) training programs. Individuals who complete an accredited CHW certification training program may apply to MDH for certification.

Improving Maternal Health in the Postpartum Period:

Strategies, Models, and the Postpartum Coverage Extension Option

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) invites you to attend a webinar on improving maternal health during the postpartum period. Most pregnancy-related deaths occur during the postpartum period, from one day to 12 months after delivery, and many deaths are the result of conditions that can be addressed with high-quality, ongoing postpartum care. This webinar will describe the clinical and social risks postpartum individuals face that contribute to their morbidity and mortality and strategies to improve postpartum care and outcomes. This webinar will also look at how the American Rescue Plan's 12-month postpartum extension option in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provides the time and access to care needed to better meet the needs of postpartum individuals.

Maryland Dent-Care Loan Assistance Repayment Program For Dentists Now Accepting Applications

The Maryland Dent Care Loan Assistance Repayment Program (MDC-LARP) is the student loan repayment program **for dentists**. Like similar physician repayment programs, MDC-LARP provides student loan repayment assistance to dentists for treating Maryland's most vulnerable populations. The purpose of MDC-LARP is to increase access to oral health care services for Maryland Medical Assistance Program (MMAP) recipients by increasing the number of dentists treating this population.

Applications are now being accepted for a 3-year term starting January 1, 2023 and are due no later than **July 29, 2022.**

Application eligibility requirements for the Maryland Dent-Care Loan Assistance Program are:

. Be a licensed dentist in the State of Maryland,

- · Have outstanding higher education loan debt,
- Be able to serve three years in a full-time (minimum 32 hours clinical with 8 hours administrative), eligible, dental practice site(s). (Providers having completed 3 years of service in the MDC-LARP program are not eligible to re-apply.)
- Treat a minimum of 30% Maryland Medicaid recipients as a portion of the total patient population already being seen at practice site,
- Be enrolled with the Maryland Healthy Smiles Program, and
- Able to keep record of all patients treated (Medicaid and non-Medicaid) and provide monthly written reports to the Office of Oral Health.



Thousands of Maryland adults are accessing dental care through the Medicaid Adult Dental Waiver Program.

According to Maryland Medicaid, from January 1,2022 through March 15, 2022:

- · 1.564 claims were submitted
- · 1,224 unique members filed valid claims
- · 25 members met annual \$800 cap
- · 343 unique providers submitted claims
- · \$262,203.51 paid

From January 1, 2021 through December 28, 2021:

- · 9,027 claims were submitted
- · 4,464 unique members filed valid claims
- · 367 members met annual \$800 cap
- · 591 unique providers submitted claims


