# NY STATE RELEASES STUDY ON DENTAL CARE, HEALTH OUTCOMES

Shows effect of preventative dental care on health outcomes, Medicaid costs

An important new study on <u>Dental Services and Health Outcomes in the New York State Medicaid</u>
<u>Program</u> demonstrates the effect of preventative dental care on health outcomes and Medicaid costs. The study, published in the Journal of Dental Research, was funded by the Santa Fe Group, John A. Hartford Foundation, and the DentaQuest Foundation.

The study of more than 500,000 New York State Medicaid recipients, nearly two-thirds of whom have one or more chronic diseases, proposed that dental services for a publicly insured population with significant systemic disease could help reduce emergency department and inpatient admissions and costs. The analysis demonstrated lower emergency department and inpatient utilization and health care costs compared to those without dental care services.

This milestone study demonstrates the association between dental care and better health outcomes, quantifies the financial benefits of dental coverage for adults on Medicaid, and provides a roadmap to enact policies to improve the oral and overall health outcomes and the fiscal health of Medicaid.

# NIDCR TO RELEASE U.S. SURGEON GENERAL'S REPORT IN FALL 2021 Follow-up to 2000 U.S. Surgeon General Report on Oral Health in America

Oral health is integral to the health and well-being of all, and the dissemination of current advances and challenges is essential for the health of our nation. As a twenty-year follow-up to the seminal Oral Health in America: A Report of the Surgeon General, the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR) will release the new report Oral Health in America: Advances and Challenges in the fall of 2021.

The report will illuminate new directions in the prevention and treatment of oral disease; identify disparities and inequalities in oral health care; and propose innovative strategies for ensuring all Americans share equally in the benefits of oral health. A forthcoming website and related publications will highlight data and key findings for oral health professionals, stakeholders and interest groups.

NIDCR acknowledges the tireless efforts of the hundreds of individuals who have contributed to the report.

# U.S. PREVENTIVE SERVICE SEEKS INPUT ON DRAFT RECOMMENDATIONS

Task force proposes screening, interventions to prevent caries in young children



The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) is currently seeking comments on a <u>draft recommendation statement and draft evidence</u> <u>review</u> on screening and interventions to prevent dental caries in children younger than age 5 years. The USPSTF recommends primary care clinicians use fluoride varnish and fluoride supplementation in young children to prevent cavities.

The period for review and public comment is open to June 7, 2021.

# ADA ISSUES GUIDANCE ON UPDATED CDC MASK RECOMMENDATIONS Posts FAQ regarding mask guidance for fully vaccinated people

The American Dental Association (ADA) has issued guidance to help

dentists answer questions about new recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) regarding mask use for fully vaccinated people.

The guidance, posted at <u>ADA.org</u> and called "CDC COVID-19 PPE Screening FAQ," answers questions including:

- Do patients still need to wear a mask when visiting a dental office?
- May dental health care personnel stop wearing masks in the breakroom?
- Should dentists continue to screen patients and dental health care personnel?



The ADA guidance lists steps to ensure that everyone adheres to source control measures and hand hygiene practices while in a health care facility, including:

- Posting visual alerts (e.g., signs, posters) at the entrance and in strategic places (e.g., waiting areas, elevators, cafeterias) to provide instructions (in appropriate languages) about wearing a well-fitting form of source control and how and when to perform hand hygiene.
- Providing supplies for respiratory hygiene and cough etiquette, including alcohol-based hand sanitizer
  with 60-95% alcohol, tissues and no-touch receptacles for disposal at health care facility entrances,
  waiting rooms, and patient check-ins.
- Limiting and monitoring points of entry to the facility.
- Establishing a process to ensure everyone entering the facility is assessed for symptoms of COVID-19 or exposure to others with suspected or confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection, and that they are practicing source control.

The ADA reminds dentists that the CDC guidance should be considered in conjunction with any state or local regulations.

# MDAC TO LAUNCH SERIES ON ORAL HEALTH EQUITY

Will address critical role of oral health equity in achieving health equity

MDAC is launching a brown bag series to address the barriers too many Marylanders face in accessing oral health care, foster cross-professional collaboration and partnerships, and work to address oral health inequities to improve both oral and overall health outcomes.

Advocates, providers, and other experts will share how oral health equity is essential to the success of initiatives to achieve health equity. Topics will include efforts to educate all Marylanders about the oral health benefits of fluoridated tap water, the importance of provider-patient communication to the oral health outcomes of African American adults, and Medicaid and Medicare workarounds to help dental patients with signs of oral cancer access further care. The series will also address how private early childhood education centers can replicate successful Head Start oral health education programs and birthing centers can leverage the new Medicaid postpartum dental and health coverage to improve pregnancy outcomes and the oral health of mother and baby.

# ORAL HEALTH IMPORTANT DURING PREGNANCY, POSTPARTUM PERIOD OOH offers oral health tips for pregnant, postpartum people



The article below was submitted by the Maryland Department of Health Office of Oral Health:

Good oral health is important for your overall health and the health of your baby. During pregnancy, changes in your body can cause your gums to be sore, red, puffy and bleed easily. If you have any of these conditions, see a dentist at once. Make an appointment to see the dentist as soon as you know you are pregnant. It is important

to have healthy teeth and gums before you deliver so germs do not pass from you.

Getting dental care while you are pregnant is safe and covered by Maryland Medicaid during pregnancy and soon, Medicaid coverage will extend a year postpartum.

Following these **tips** will help keep you and your baby stay healthy.

# APPLY NOW FOR CHW CERTIFICATION BASED ON EXPERIENCE

Application deadline is June 30, 2021

Applications for CHW certification based on experience will now be accepted through **June 30, 2021**. Visit the CHW Certification homepage for information about certification, full eligibility requirements, and application instructions.

To apply for CHW certification based on experience:

- Log into Maryland OneStop
- Upload the required form of age verification and two letter of validation forms
- Submit the application

Once the experience pathway closes, the only pathway to CHW certification will be based on the completion of an accredited CHW certification training program.

# MD ADULT DENTAL WAIVER PROGRAM BY THE NUMBERS



Thousands of Maryland adults are accessing dental care through the Medicaid Adult Dental Waiver Program.

According to Maryland Medicaid, from January 1, 2021 through May 27, 2021:

- 3,355 claims were submitted
- 2,293 unique members filed valid claims
- 91 members met annual \$800 cap
- 446 unique providers submitted claims
- \$539,612.30 paid


# **Oral Health Policy**

- 7,903 claims were submitted
- 4,131 unique members filed valid claims
- 313 members met annual \$800 cap
- 576 unique providers submitted claims
- \$1,281,213.61 paid

Note: 2020 numbers have been adjusted to reflect claims received after the first of the year for services performed in 2020.

Since the June 1, 2019 launch of the Medicaid Adult Dental Waiver Program, Medicaid has paid \$3,179,540.44 in dental services for thousands of Maryland adults.
